

**MINUTES OF THE VAN BUREN COUNTY COMMISSION  
VAN BUREN COUNTY, TENNESSEE**

The Van Buren County Commission met in a Regular Meeting on April 18, 2023 at 6:00 p.m. at the Van Buren County Administrative Facility & Justice Center. The following action was taken as recorded in Minute Book, "T".

**Call to Order**

Sheriff Michael Brock called the Meeting to Order.

**Roll Call**

Members present: Michael Chandler, Cale Crain, Jordan Delong, Tabitha Denney, Terry Hickey, Terry Hodges, Dusty Madewell and Michael Woodlee. Commissioners Kenny Smith and Brick Wall were absent.

Commissioner Dusty Madewell led us in prayer.

Chairman Terry Hickey led us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

**Approval of Minutes of Meeting on March 21, 2023 as printed.**

Cale Crain made a motion, second by Dusty Madewell to approve the minutes from the March 21, 2023 meeting. All agreed by voice vote. 0-opposed. Motion passed.

**Resolution for Solid Waste 10 year plan by Lisa Luck**

Lisa Luck from the Upper Cumberland Development District was present at the Meeting to ask for approval for the Solid Waste Annual 2022 Ten year plan. Each Region submits an original 10 Year Plan detailing the roles and responsibilities of those who provide Solid Waste and materials management services. The State requires each Region to submit an annual progress report covering the next 10 Years that serves as routine update to the Region's original 10 Year Plan. Each County comprehensive integrative municipal Solid Waste management plan then modifies, updates and contributes to each Regions' Plan. Information provided in the following fields will serve as the County's comprehensive integrative municipal Solid Waste Management Plan which informs updates to each Region's annual progress report.

The Ten Year Plan for Van Buren County is to find a Convenience Center for the Piney Community because of this one being closed. Van Buren County provides 5 Convenience Centers for the residences to dispose of their trash with the Green box in the Cummingsville Area and the State doesn't like the Green Boxes because anyone can dispose of anything hazardous waste with it not being mandated. At some point the State is going to request that the Green Box drop to be shut down and look into other options. Van Buren County is at 30% this year on recycling and that is above what it has been.

After much discussion on this matter, Michael Woodlee made a motion, second by Jordan Delong to approve this 10 year plan for Solid Waste. All approved by voice vote. Motion passed. **The 10 Year Plan will now go to the Solid Waste Committee for approval. Solid Waste 10 yr. Plan as following:**

**Landfill:** Means a facility where solid wastes are disposed of by burial in excavated pits or trenches or by placement on land and covering with soil or other approved material.

**Class I Disposal Facility:** Refers to a sanitary landfill which serves a municipal institutional, and/or rural population and is used or to be used for disposal of domestic wastes, commercial wastes, institutional wastes, municipal solid wastes, bulky wastes, landscaping and land clearing wastes, industrial wastes, construction/demolition wastes, farming wastes, shredded automotive tires, dead animals, and special wastes.

**Class III Disposal Facility:** refers to a landfill which is used or to be used for the disposal of farming wastes, landscaping and land clearing wastes, demolition/construction waste, shredded automotive tires, and/or certain wastes having similar characteristics and approved in writing by the Department.

**Class IV Disposal Facility:** refers to a landfill which is used or to be used for the disposal of demolition/construction wastes, shredded automotive tires, and certain wastes having similar characteristics and approved in writing by the Department.

**Calendar Year Data TDEC receives from Class I and Class III/IV Facilities will be entered by TDEC staff. These facilities and associated tonnages will be used towards calculating the Solid Waste Region's 25% Waste Reduction and Diversion Goal.**

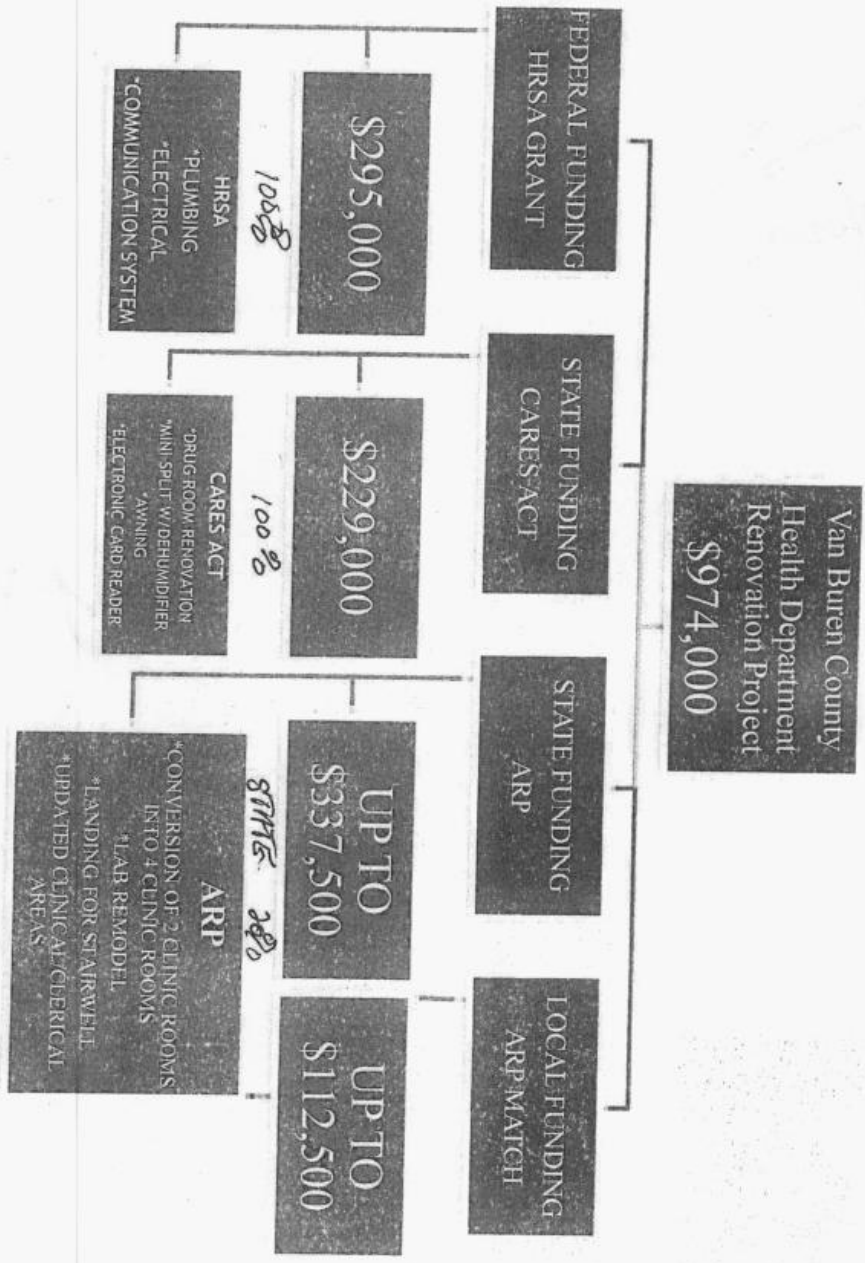

### **Setting up an Industrial Development Board for Van Buren County**

County Attorney Howard Upchurch stated, "There is not an Industrial Development Board in Van Buren County on record with the Secretary of State. There is a Van Buren Development Company that was chartered in October 1972 but dissolved in October in 1984." "There is an Industrial Development Board in Spencer that is also now dissolved and this took place in 2017." After much discussion on this matter, Mayor David Sullivan stated, "We need a Board in Place." Chairman Terry Hickey agreed that we would find out more information and address this matter again. County Attorney Upchurch thinks the County need to re-charter to set up an Industrial Development Board for Van Buren County.

### **Director of Schools was present to discuss the County's Maintenance of Effort**

Director of Schools Cheryl Cope was present to update the Full Commission on the County's Maintenance of Effort with the School System. The TISA Projected Maintenance of Effort was \$1,559,528.00 and Van Buren County's 2021/2022 funds that were matched were \$2,014,111.00, so Van Buren County is good with their maintenance of effort and does not need to fund \$400,000.00 more in the upcoming years.
